and vibrant history, plenty of cactus, dust, and of course... Cowboys.


As the end of February approached, more than 650 Cowboys began to congregate at the Ben Avery Shooting Facility in Phoenix, Arizona for the SASS

and their countless volunteers, known as Rangers, transform Ben Avery into a Cowboy haven. Countless hours of hard work, planning, and preparation all culminate for this one week of competition amongst our SASS Family. Thank you to the Arizona Territorial Company of Rough Riders for putting on an event that Cowboys and Cowgirls alike can come to enjoy, compete and maybe even get a complementary dust spa treatment.

The cool desert air began to warm and the sun rose across the range on February 24 as the Wild Bunch Action Shooting World Championship kicked off with 141 competitors, followed by two days filled with the Wild Bunch Opening Ceremonies, the WBAS Main Match, and culminated with the Top Gun Shoot Off and Awards. A big congratulations to the Ladies Wild Bunch World Champion, Holy Terror (SASS #15362), and the Men's Wild Bunch World Champion, Skrap P (SASS #105726). We look forward to seeing you all next year!

As the Wild Bunch match wound down, the work for the Arizona Territorial Company of Rough Riders was far from over. Even as Wild Bunch awards were taking place, many of the volunteers were out on the range getting ready for what was to come next, the Cowboy Action Shooting World Championship. Wednesday morning came into view as a flurry of competitors began to arrive and ready for what fun the day was to bring. Some might say the range was even busier than the streets of an old west town coming to life as Cowboys and Cowgirls started their days, shops opened for business, and the saloon occupants headed home after a ruckus of a night.

In this case, the shops that began to open were the Vendors throughout Sutler's Row. This year 35 vendors attended END of TRAIL and gave us Cowboys and Cowgirls lots to see and even more to buy. The sunny Arizona Wednesday was filled with warm ups for the Cowboy competitors, speed events, long range events, the Plainsman event, and the Opening Ceremonies. The day flew by as it does when one is having fun and before you could blink, Opening Ceremonies were about to begin. Rattlesnake Slim (SASS #91827) began

the Cowboy Action Opening Ceremonies with a warm welcome to all the competitors, a big thank you to all match sponsors (23 to be exact!), volunteers, and the introduction of the Match Director Red River Wrangler (SASS #52503) and Co-Match Director Serenity (SASS #64982), followed by a beautiful invocation given by Lash Toru (SASS #85004). Turquoise Bill (SASS #39118), was recognized for his many years of service as a Rough Rider and his retirement was announced.

This year 11 countries were represented at END of TRAIL from across the world, including Australia, Canada, Czech Republic, Great Britain, Germany, Mexico, New Zealand, Norway, Slovakia, Sweden, and the United States. Yes, you read the right, for the first time in EOT history, Mexico was represented by Adelita (SASS #113569), confirmed by Tex (SASS #4) during the ceremony. As a collective, SASS members traveled more than 732,000 miles and sent around 311,000 rounds down range. The presentation of Flags is a big part of the opening ceremonies and it is truly moving to witness the pride that each competitor has in carrying their country's flag. As the American flag was presented, Thin Mint (SASS #112898) sang a wonderful rendition of the National Anthem and a thunderous swell of clapping and yee-haws erupted as she sang the final notes.

The announcement of the 2025 class of Regulators was presented by SASS CEO Misty Moonshine (SASS #83232). This honor is one that is not taken lightly as it represents the true personification of the Cowboy Way and those awarded with this honor are shining examples of what is meant by the Spirit of the Game. Congratulations to the 2025 class of Regulators, you have most certainly earned it, and we thank you for your dedication to SASS, your clubs, and fellow Cowboy family. The evening ended with a delicious BBQ dinner provided by Grill King BBQ and some Cowboy Karaoke hosted by Ranger Worse Case Scenario (SASS #112070). Let's just say that no saloon singer held a candle to the Cowboys and Cowgirls who decided to serenade us during karaoke.

The dust would not stay settled for long on Thursday morning as the first

day of the Cowboy Action Shooting World Championship geared up and so did the wind! The highest clocked wind gust was 80 miles per hour and it sunk the boat... in the middle of the desert. Only one passenger was aboard the boat when it sunk and luckily Mustang Dave (SASS #95854) had minimal injuries. Thanks to the wonderful Rangers who made sure Mustang Dave was okay and able to continue shooting the match. While the wind continued and the term Cowboy Up was perpetuated, three waves of the main match got underway and the day's schedule concluded with the SASS Territorial Governors meeting and the swap meet, which was filled with bargains as far as the eye could see in the main tent.

Friday morning brought a calm breeze and plenty of sunshine... a welcome change from the dust bath everyone had received the day before. Another day of throwing lead down range ended with a delicious Mexican dinner in the main tent provided by Don Jose's, the presentation of Side Match Awards, and the world-famous World Championship of Cowboy Bingo sponsored by Light Bender (SASS #103409) of Hunters HD Gold. The competition was steep, but CC Moonshine (SASS #62639) came out victorious as the World Champion of Cowboy Bingo and took home the coveted Cowboy Bingo Buckle.

Saturday signaled the last day of the competition, which for any competitor is both nerve-racking and bittersweet. The mix of emotions is one we all know too well as you begin to review the match and wonder where you might end up and reminisce about the wonderful week you have had with friends new and old. With the sun starting to set and the day coming to an end, the shooting was complete, the range closed, and the evening festivities were about to begin. The saloon opened and folks dressed in their finest attire began to fill the main tent awaiting the Evening Costume Contest and fun to begin. The main tent was brimming with laughter and the sound of smiles floated across the air as tales were told of the past week of competition and comradery. Offerings of delicious food in a buffet style were provided by Chef John for all to enjoy.

The evening kicked off with the Costume promenade and the Evening Costume Contest awards. Applause filled the main tent as each name was called and folks once again admired contestants' costumes. The Ladies of Cowboy Action Shooting (LOCAS) group awarded this year's EOT 2025 Cowgirl of Honor award and gave recognition to Sunshine Kay (SASS #17452). Another deserving cowgirl,

Half-A-Hand Henri (SASS #9727) was recognized and awarded the honor of being the 2025 Legendary LOCAS. The long-awaited announcement of the Top 16 contenders was declared which gave way to the evening's entertainment, The Pat James Band. Live music filled the tent as folks continued to linger around the saloon and some took to the dance floor to cut a rug.

The cool desert sunrise of Sunday morning faded away as the desert sun intensified and the Top 16 contenders readied themselves for the Top Gun Shoot off to commence. Anticipation and excitement surged through the crowd that began to gather to watch the final standoff of competitors. With each round, the crowd grew louder in their cheers and in the end, Cimarron Sierra (SASS #110927), at only 17 years old and shooting Lady Gunfighter took the victory as Top Lady and REPHIL (SASS #5897) took Top Man, besting Cimarron Sierra in the head-to-head.

With the final shot sent down range, it was time for the awards ceremony to begin and END of TRAIL 2025 paid homage to the champions of 52 shooting categories. Among those competitors, Echo Sackett (SASS #113910) was the youngest competitor at eight years of age and the match's oldest competitor at 89 years was California Dutchman (SASS #27556). There were a total of 35 competitors who shot the match clean — approximately six percent of the total number of participants. With each category top ten lining up on stage, cheers, hugs and booming applause filled the tent in praise and congratulations on what each competitor had achieved. The Overall World Champions were all that was left to be crowned and with skill, speed and accuracy Holy Terror from Cleveland, TX came out triumphant as the 2025 Ladies Overall World Champion. Whistlin Will (SASS #88382) of Courtenay, Canada took home the title of 2025 Men's Overall World Champion, making it his first Overall World Champion win- and the first Canadian to take the World title.

All good things dust come to an end (pun intended) and END of TRAIL 2025 was the master of dust; it sure knew how to shake things up and keep us cowboys and cowgirls on our toes. Until next year, see you down the trail!



# WILD BUNCH ACTION SHOOTING WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP END OF TRAIL 2025

here's only one World Championship of Wild Bunch Action Shooting, so welcome to the 2025 END of TRAIL, held at the superb Ben Avery Range, just up the road from Phoenix, Arizona!

The Arizona Territorial Company of Rough Riders go all out for the creation of this match, and that is evident from the care that goes into the construction of each stage. The pristine bays, the impressive stage props, and the sheer multitude of steel that is carried, arranged, and painted for the shooters are testimonials to this. You know you are at a special event, before the first timer beep has sounded or the first


round has gone downrange.

What should you expect from the World Championship? For starters, a good variety of stage designs, a few brain teasers, and targets that force the shooters to mind their sights. This ain't no spray 'n' pray match, pards.

Then, there is the camaraderie among the competitors. I have dinner the night before the match begins with Mad Cat With a Gun (SASS #101175), a delightful shooter from Norway. I brought out a thousand rounds for a squad of shooters from the Czech Republic, traded barbs with REPHIL (SASS #5897) and Dammit Olli (SASS #68338) from Germany, and tips with

Coffee (SASS #7008) from Texas.

As I pulled up to the Big Tent the day before, the Arizona Rangers organization was well-poised for the influx of shooters. My package had gone walkabout, but after a bit of shuffling around, Sunshine Kay (SASS #17452) worked her logistical magic, and I was assigned to Posse 703, headed up by Wooden Nichols (SASS #104984). He's a long-time Wild Bunch shooter, and in addition to smoothly running the posse he good-naturedly brought along a bag of Jolly Rancher candies, inviting any competitor who cleaned a stage to help themselves. Did I mention that Wild Bunch is a bit more of a challenge than

Cowboy Action Shooting? It was not a big bag of candy, and at the end of the match he took most of it home. It was that kind of match!

I had some august company on my

posse. Misty Moonshine (SASS #83232), CEO of SASS was there, shooting her first major Wild Bunch match (spoiler alert — she really performed well!) along with C. C. Moonshine (SASS #62639),

who clearly has a good deal of semi-auto experience under his belt judging from the facility with which he ran the match. Multiple time champion Texas Tiger (SASS #74829) was also on the posse, her skill set demonstrating why she is a multiple-time winner. Until the wheels fell off, which can happen to anyone.

Oh, there was a good cross section of shooters on Posse 703, from newbies, to old timers. One of my posse mates was Sidewinder (SASS #26)!

Match day dawned clear and cool, and after the brief shooters' meeting, it was time to head out to the range! Swallowing my first stage jitters, I pulled out a clean stage, a bit slower than I'd like, but I hate throwing away a match before the seats are warm, y'know?

It was a tough match, and by the end of the first day, our posse had only one clean competitor — lady shooter, Lucky Wheeler (SASS #35686). When the sun rose over the horizon for the second day, everyone, and I mean everyone, was rooting for her to garner a clean match. On the first stage, nerves, target distances, and the weight of the pressure combined to end her clean run, which she took with a smile and a shrug. It may be that she was actually a bit relieved. She was able to relax with those first misses out of the way.

Old friend Blake Wade (SASS #82593) was there, a bit stove up, but he was not going to let mere physical injury get in the way of having a good time. That's the spirit, Blake!

Despite having apparently standardized on seven-round rifle runs, the match designers seem to have gotten away from allowing shooters who choose to do so to shoot the rifle sweeps with their 1911. If I may editorialize a bit here, I like giving the shooters that option. For shooters who complain they don't want match designers to "cowboy their Wild Bunch," the greater difficulty of shooting even more challenging targets with their 1911 should satisfy that craving.

And Arizona cooperated, by providing some splendid weather, so the shooting conditions were, honestly, pretty ideal. I can recall a couple of years in the past when the weather presented as much of a challenge as the stage scenarios, but for the second year in a row, it was pleasant shooting weather.

Some helpful stuff... targets with

multiple hits are painted contrasting colors, to help allay any confusion. There's plenty of running on the boardwalks between stage left and stage right. This is an Action Shooting sport, after all!

There were a couple of brain teasers, as I mentioned. Stage 3 featured split shotgun with eight rounds, offering some intriguing possibilities for reloading on

the run. (Or, keeping it simple, which I would normally choose to do.) My plan was to run with the action open, fire the two remaining shots on the far side of the stage, and then reload. Then I watched as a couple of shooters on my posse ran with the action closed, stuffing the two extra shots into the magazine tube, while on the move. "Oh, that's for

me!" I thought, so I tried it myself. The buzzer went off, I blasted away, and my reflexes immediately went to war with my best intentions. I wanted to, I really intended to, keep that action closed with the hammer down, after those first four shots. Beeeep! I fired my first four shots and kicked the action open. Banging that shotgun action open after each shot is so ingrained in me, it overcame my best intentions. Action open, well, now I can't load the mag tube on the move. Grumbling and berating myself with what I hoped was my inside voice, I sprinted to the far end of the stage, fired the two remaining rounds, and reloaded the last two shots off my belt. It cost me a few seconds, but at least I cleaned the stage. Grrrr... I'll take it.

Stage 5 featured a clockwise sweep on the rifle targets, which were far enough out there that I considered using the elevator notch on my '73. Probably should have — I took a rifle miss on that stage. Clean match gone. There's more... the stage called for split shotgun targets again. Based on my experience back on Stage 3, once again I intended to fire and run with the action closed on a spent cartridge. Then, the buzzer went off, I ran the shotgun at (what for me is) breakneck speed, and whanged that action open as soon as I fired it. Sigh. I need a louder inside voice. Next time, for sure, FIT.

Stage 6 had a dueling tree AND a hostage target. IPSC shooters ate it up. The rest of the posse — well, we mostly just ate it.

Stage 7 was the ever-popular all-knockdown stage. This year they eliminated the option of using the rifle from the stage, which to my mind was curious, as leaving it in offered the shooters the choice of using the rifle or pistol, at the shooter's discretion, which I really enjoy. All pistol it is, then. Beeep! The knockdowns all cooperated, unlike the unfortunate events on the same bay for the Cowbov match, and so, shooters could keep blasting away until they cleaned the stage. I'm not going to say that I'm NOT completely confident in my abilities... I staged a couple of magazines at the last two shooting positions. Mercifully, I didn't need them!

Stage 10 was my favorite, though. Starting with a magazine on the table, with an empty gun (!) the shooter had

to load, rack, and get to it. The Nevada sweeps were easy to navigate and the target distances were sufficiently shooter friendly that at last the shooters could blaze a bit with their pistols, at least, for better or worse. Mine was better! I was glad of that. These eyes ain't getting any younger.

With a few minutes to spare after the competition, I got hornswoggled into the costume competition by Marshal W. Hill (SASS #88223) and his good-natured crew, and spent among the more enjoyable few minutes of the entire match demonstrating my carefully assembled kit. An extra smile, as I came home with a third place trophy for my shooting costume!

The awards were Tuesday night, and

were commendable for the cheery nature of the event, the quality of the trophies, and the brevity with which the event was conducted. There are a whole lot less categories in Wild Bunch than in Cowboy Action Shooting, for better or worse, but man, that sure does speed the process!

I have to shout out the shooters from Slovakia. These guys ran into trouble at the London airport and pulled into Ben Avery very late, the night before the event began. Using borrowed ammunition and kit, jet-lagged, with no food and very little sleep under their belts, Dedo (SASS #10181) pulled off a third place in Senior, Phil Grave (SASS #106146) a third in Traditional, and even Colbert (SASS #87058) managed a creditable 20th in Modern. I've been there, and

that's a great finish, lads. Overall Winners and Wild Bunch World Champions were Skrap P. (SASS #105726) and Holy Terror (SASS #15362). Holy Terror was also the only clean match shooter. Visit endoftrail.org for complete results.

I am remiss if I don't mention I was asked by color guard leader and volunteer coordinator, Captain Dan Blodgett (SASS #75655) to pin his new Regulator badge on his chest. An honor, sir.

If you have a 1911 (and honestly, what red-blooded American doesn't?) SASS has made it pretty easy to play this game. Any SASS legal rifle and SASS legal shotgun and a 1911 will get you in the game. Stick a toe in the water folks. It's great fun, and I'm certain you'll love it!

## **SKINNY'S SOAPBOX**

#### THOMPSON RIFLES

his issue features an article by Colonel Montana Kid Hammer (SASS #6476) postulating on the use of the .45 ACP semi-automatic Thompson rifle in Wild Bunch matches and/or Wild Bunch side matches. That sounds like fun! But make it clear — neither 1927 nor 1942 pattern Thompsons are SASS legal in Wild Bunch. Both models appeared too late in the twentieth century to fit the period portrayed. Even if we accept arms that existed through World War I - a period that has become accepted in Wild Bunch costuming — the 1927 Thompson arrived on the scene just a little too late. So it's fun to think about utilizing a Thompson in Wild Bunch, but it's really not appropriate (even for side matches) and I doubt it will ever come to pass. Individual clubs (below state-level matches) are of course free to experiment with such things.

Having said that, Thompsons are really cool. I don't own one but I've always wanted to and the Colonel's writing has rekindled that desire. Perhaps I'll be on the lookout for one, and if I ever get one, and if I ever travel to the Colonel's neck of the woods (Alaska), perhaps I'll try to compete with it.

#### **COMIC BOOK CORNER**

Regular readers know I often run public-domain reprints of old western comic book stories — primarily from the 1940s and 1950s — in the digital-only issues of *The Cowboy Chronicle*. They never appear in printed issues because I don't like to use up space that could be otherwise used for legitimate SASS news.







### BORDERTOWN 2024 ARIZONA STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

ordertown is the Arizona SASS State Championship of Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>™</sup>. And, folks, there's simply no match like it, anywhere. It's the fastest, most furious video game of a Cowboy match you'll ever see, and shooting it will take your breath away. The target distances and stage scenarios turn ordinary shooters into heroes and heroes into legends. As Sassy Dancer (SASS #70118), the match ramrod, said in her brief but informative safety meeting, "We started 24 years ago to build a match where any shooter, from beginner to the champion, could say, 'I just shot the fastest stage I ever shot in my whole life!" And boy howdy, once again, did they succeed!

It is the fastest match in the world and people come from all over the world to shoot it. Strolling along the firing line, I bump into Joe Dakota (SASS #64518), who has come over from Germany. Out in the parking lot, I see license plates from almost a dozen states and I've made the drive all the way from California to "See the Elephant," as the sign on the archway proudly proclaims as you drive onto the range.


Held just outside Tombstone, Arizona, once called by contemporaries, "The town too tough to die," Tombstone is a touchstone of the American West, steeped in gunpowder, lead, and blood. Not ten minutes from the range, a visitor can walk the very streets where the Earp brothers clashed with the Clantons, where the Gunfight at the O.K. Corral wrote a crimson chapter into American history, and where starry-eyed prospector Ed Schliefflen came looking for silver. Local folks promised he would find only his Tombstone.

Well, now it's the home of the Arizona State Cowboy Championship. Here, new legends will be written at breakneck speed, and where the fastest shooters come to display their talents and ply their trade.

After a long drive from Southern California, Scarlett Raine (SASS

#110134) and I pull into a nice Air B&B hosted by the good folks from Mernickle Leather, Happy Shootzmore (SASS #101003), Tam Bam (SASS #101005), and Harry Trigger (SASS #85480). Mernickle Leather does so much to promote our sport, and they make such terrific leather gear for Cowboy Action Shooting™, that it's a treat to spend a bit more time with these folks


than just saying, "howdy!"

It's a pretty good drive from California, so it's late Monday night when we pull in and, emptying the car, we are aghast to realize that one of the two people in the car forgot to pack Scarlett Raine's Cowboy clothes. This is an epic contretemps, and worthy of a good thrashing, but Scarlett good-naturedly refuses to either despair or punish the maroon who forgot it. And word gets out, so within an hour of waking up the following morning, the ladies in the Cowboy community have banded together and Ms. Scarlett is soon sporting a fresh wardrobe; some finds from a local thrift store, some borrowed, some bought from the on-site vendors. Crisis averted, let's get to shooting!

Tuesday is side match day with a raft of speed events, long range, Plainsman, and my favorite, Wild Bunch. Bright and early, the shots start to ring out for Wild Bunch, and true to Bordertown form, all six stages are fast, close, and furious. Match director Zona (SASS #54629) has been designing WB matches for years and has a wealth of experience to draw from, so it is a great match. There's plenty of 1911 action, including one 42-round stage, which is classic Zona. Also classic Zona, it was typically well-designed and there was little confusion, just plenty of shooting!

On my posse are several of my favorite shooters; Garrison Joe (SASS #60708), The Butcher (SASS #6030), and, new to me, his son Little Butcher (SASS #6031), who is destined to win Men's Modern, and the match, overall.

Did I mention the driver of the car that I was driving may have forgotten to pack a certain señorita's clothing? That wasn't the only thing the unfortunate oaf neglected to bring along. On my first stage, my trusty 1897 does what '97s love to do and shucks out an unfired round. With a sigh, I slap one in as the time ticks relentlessly on and complete the stage. Then it does it again, on the next stage. Why? Why, oh my trusty... wait a minute. I look at the bolt, and realize to my horror that I have brought a shotgun that is intended for the gunsmith's attention, and my race-ready '97 is resting comfortably back at home in the gun safe. Sigh. It's gonna be that kind of a week. With my Model 12 out on loan, I'm just going

to have to suck it up, and do the best I can.

You know the old saw about the '97—nobody can own just one, you have to own three. One at the gunsmith's shop, the broken one in your cart, and the one you're holding... which is getting ready to break... Yeah.

I can only shake my head and ruminate on the words to a couple of songs

I know well (because I wrote them...), "The Wreck of the Old '97" and "97 Ways to Break Your Heart."

I blast my way through the rest of the match, perfecting my shotgun reloading technique, and am fortunate to finish first in Men's Senior Modern, missing out on the Overall behind Little Butcher by less than two seconds. That's real racing, folks, and the sign of a ter-

rific match! Overall Lady was Whirlwind Wendy (SASS #79889).

The Plainsman category took place after WB in the afternoon, and with some of the fastest names in the game entering it, the boom and plumes of black powder shooting echoed over the range. I've got to try that sometime soon. Those guys sound like they are having waaay too much fun! And black powder is quick, fun, and easy to clean up, right? Overall winners were Gilly Boy (SASS #18499) and Blackfire Opal

(SASS #104823).

After a day of shooting it was time to head back for dinner, and to catch up on some much needed sleep. There'll be time to visit with friends and do the town properly, tomorrow!

Wednesday brought the Bordertown Blast. These four-stage warm-ups have no bearing on the match outcome, but they are a chance to navigate the props, take in the target size and distance, and generally blaze away as you get the lay of the land. And there's always bragging rights! I'm pretty pleased with my efforts, and my warm up posse feels the same. We have Hawkeye Hart (SASS #112564) and Calamity Gray (SASS #112565), a couple of junior shooters, who are sparking the posse. Jax T (SASS #106617) and family came for the Bordertown experience and were not disappointed. Mojo Rising (SASS #106938), Sandstone Drifter (SASS #111617), Dixie Dawn (SASS #111743), and Dodge City Dixie (SASS #90920) were all shooting in the midteens and hoots and hollers abounded. Sassy Dancer made having a good time the goal, the Arizona crew delivered on their promise of fast and fun, and the posse was loving it.

Speed matches followed and some unbelievable times emerged. I am slowing down in my old age and struggled to stay in the low three-second range with my rifle. The number of shooters in the low two- and high one-second range was astonishing. Ditto the revolvers. Sheesh! I gotta practice more! It was a day filled with amazing displays, very little pressure, a lot of shooting, and breakneck speeds.

Thursday brings the real deal — Main Match, Day 1, Posse 1, Bay 1. I drew the first day 8:00 a.m. rotation. After a short and to the point shooters meeting, mentioned above, our posse meets up at the range. Alberta Annie (SASS #85914) is our Posse Marshal, and she's a delight. Clear, concise, and cheerful, our posse quickly drops into a routine, and starts clicking as smoothly

as train wheels over rails. Spotters, brass pickers, and shotgun re-setters hop to it, and all there is to it is to work a bit, load up, and shoot.

The stage instructions are so simple, and the distances are so close, a Cowboy should just blaze through the stages. But, as I go to the line, there's a bit of first stage jitters on hand, too. That's all part of the fun, right? The first shots ring out, and with them begin the litany of shucked out rifle rounds, missed shotgun make-ups, and disbelief at missed shots, as wide-eyed shooters find their limits and maybe step over them a time or two. It's all great fun, and hearty whoops and "Whoo-Yeahs!" echo across the range for every clean stage.

As mentioned before, there are some amazing shooters at this match, and the machine-gun cacophony emanating from adjacent ranges is a bit disconcerting to us mere mortals. The bays are close enough that you can hear when the fast guys on adjacent stages go to work. Smokestack (SASS #87384) is smoking, Cody James (SASS #90540) is putting on a display, and Gut C. Gunman (SASS #105725) is showing why we... more seasoned shooters... might want to spend a little more time practicing.

I load up and head to the line. The targets are close and easy, and I absolutely blaze through the stage... until I get to the shotgun. That blinking '97... Clank. A shell sticks in the ejection port, then turns around. They work SO much better when they eject. *Sigh*. Another verse for "The Wreck of the Ol' '97" writes itself.

That's how the day is gonna go. That does little to diminish the fact that I'm shooting with great folks, competing on great stages, with a fun posse. And even fumbling along with the pack, I'm having a great time. Unlike a certain redhead, at least I have my own clothes.

After the shooting, a group of us head out to Tombstone, for a sashay down Allan Street, to walk in the footsteps of the Earps and the Cowboys. It's a bit touristy, but it's real cowboy history, and kind of a Mecca for cowboys. There's no shortage of Cowboy Action Shooters™ strolling around, most of them better turned out in costume than the re-enactors who put on gunfights regularly through the day. I watch

opperhead Joe (SASS #39162) and Cat A Tonic (SASS #109664) met one evening in Kentucky in 2019. He asked her to fly to AZ to attend a certain famous Cowboy match in Tombstone. one group; they do a creditable show. And my date reaches out and whispers, "I could take those guys, y'know..."

Friday, Day 2. This time, we start on the 2:00 rotation. It's warm, but not uncomfortably so, and the posse has settled down a bit. I've gone over the shotgun, replaced the left side extractor, and the result knocks about five seconds off of each of my stage times. Better!

Plenty of movement, lots of variety, and those targets... Scarlett Raine has been shooting a little undertwo years and she rips off a 22-second stage. The beaming smile on her face says she'll be back.

That night, there is a party at Monument Ranch, a western-themed ranch on the outskirts of town. I have been asked to play by our hosts, Ambs Aces (SASS #103511) and High Dollar (SASS #105250), and so out comes the guitar, and in moments, the crowd is shouting for "Shotgun and Shovel," "The Oops Song," and roaring back the chorus to, "Shut up and Dance." Then I am joined by Mad Trapper of Rat River (SASS #78641), and the exuberant sounds of his old-timey fiddle and my guitar under the waning moon make for a magical evening. The food is great, the crowd is wonderful, and under the stars, some real western magic is taking place. It's a delightful and well-attended event, but there's still shooting to be done, so we get to bed a just a smidgen later than is responsible.

Saturday, Day 3. Having shot the early and late rotations, on our last day we shoot the middle rotation, and by now, the kinks are worked out. After a few late-night tweaks, the '97 has stopped beating me up, the weather is just about perfect; I screw together a few decent stages and pull out a clean match. Clean, but s-l-o-w. Despite that, with a great posse and terrific stages, I'm having a wonderful time. The Arizona clan have managed to pull off a match which is both cutting edge SASS and which contains a few of the elements that the old-timers in the sport have always enjoyed; things like starting a stage by throwing a rubber chicken into a pot, or clutching a skunk to your chest. It's all in good fun, and that's why we're here, right?

The match over and all the pressure gone, I wander through the little

vendor's encampment. American Gun Works is there; I watch as a separated case head is pulled from Utah Blaine's (SASS #54601) rifle, getting him back in the game before his posse is done shooting the stage. It's a deft bit of gunsmithing, but they won't take a dime for the trouble.

Jim Downing, one of the finest engravers in the game, as well as proprietor of the finest mustache in SASS, is busy working his art on a clutch of guns, but finds time to engrave a star on the empty cylinder for each of Scarlett's revolvers, chatting up a humorous storm the entire time. Next to his tent, nobody knows more about shotguns than Johnny Meadows (SASS #28485) and he's there dispensing wisdom and shotguns to all passersby. Friday evening, a group hung around to enjoy my annu-















În addition to the main match, competitors enjoyed long-range, Wild Bunch and Plainsman events. Always a







# FROM HERO TO ZERO THE POSTWAR CAREER OF JAMES LONGSTREET

ames Longstreet was one of the Confederacy's most famous generals. He took part in most of the Army of Virginia's major battles and was a deciding factor in one of the Army of Tennessee's few victories, the Battle of Chickamauga. Though seriously wounded at the Battle of the Wilderness in May 1864, he returned to duty four months later to serve until the surrender at Appomattox in April 1865. He doesn't match Stonewall Jackson in terms of military genius; in fact he made some notable flubs, but he was solid, professional, and reliable. Robert E. Lee called Longstreet his "Old War Horse." At the end of the war, his

reputation in the South was excellent, but only a few years later he became a scapegoat and a pariah to many of his former colleagues.

Before the Civil War broke out, according to some sources, Longstreet was rather tepid about the topic of secession. His attitude toward slavery was more favorable; he owned several slaves and came from a slaveholding family. He was a native Georgian, so that fact is hardly surprising. Following the bombardment of Fort Sumter, he, like many of his southern West Point classmates, resigned his commission as a brevet major in the U.S. Army. He traveled from New Mexico Territory to become a brigadier general in the newly formed Confederate Army in May 1861. After that, he was all in with secession.

Among other things, Longstreet fully supported the Confederate policy of returning escaped slaves to their masters in the event of their capture. He also used the threat of a widespread slave revolt as a tool for motivating his troops after the Emancipation Proclamation went into effect. When the Confederate Army captured Blacks in Union territory, it wasn't picky about who had been a freeman as opposed to who was a runaway or a "contraband." It seems Longstreet had little problem rounding up suspicious-looking Blacks and sending them to captivity in the South.


In a famous dispute, he and Lee disagreed about how to properly conduct the Battle of Gettysburg. When the Union forces proved difficult to dislodge after the first day, Longstreet argued for bypassing them and forcing them to fight on terrain that was more favorable to the Confederates. Longstreet could be slow on the best of days but at Gettysburg he was downright balky. He was especially dismayed by the prospect of a frontal

assault on the third day of the battle. When he finally gave the order for the charge to commence, he looked like he was about to vomit. Hindsight shows Longstreet was correct in his assessment of the Union position. Even though he was correct, this dispute with Lee would haunt Longstreet during the years after the war.

After Gettysburg, Longstreet requested and was granted a transfer to the Western Theater, where he served under General Braxton Bragg. Longstreet saved the day at the Battle of Chickamauga when he ordered an attack that broke the Union lines. Unfortunately for the Confederates, Union General George Thomas was able to make a stand that allowed the Union forces to escape to Chattanooga. Following Chickamauga, Longstreet was given a semi-autonomous command with the objective of capturing Knoxville, but that campaign turned out to be a disaster. Much of the blame for that disaster justifiably falls on Longstreet. Eventually, he and his men were transferred back to the Army of Northern Virginia.

Longstreet rejoined Lee's command just in time for the Battle of the Wilderness in May 1864. At that battle, he was wounded by his fellow Confederates near the spot where Stonewall Jackson was also shot by friendly fire the previous year. It was a sad irony. He spent a long convalescence recovering from a wound that would probably have killed most people; he'd been shot in the shoulder, but the bullet also ripped open a gash in his throat. Somehow he survived and rejoined Lee in October 1864. Longstreet served until the bitter end at Appomattox in April 1865. One of his last recommendations to Lee was, "General, unless he (Grant) offers us honorable terms, come back and let us fight it out!"

Although he wasn't present at the McLean House for the actual surrender, Longstreet visited the place shortly afterwards at Grant's invitation. He was pleasantly surprised by his old friend Ulysses Grant's warm greeting. Grant acted as though nothing had really happened during the time when they served together in the pre-Civil War US Army. It made an enormous and lasting impression on Longstreet. Though depressed at the South's defeat, he accepted it without looking back.

During the first few years after the war had ended, Longstreet attempted to rebuild his life. He moved to New Orleans and was joined by his wife. The immediate months after the war were unpleasant for ex-Confederate generals. There had been talk about trying them for treason. Longstreet's name was prominently on the list. When the indictment proceedings began Grant personally interceded with President Johnson and threatened to resign from the Army if they continued. On June 20, 1865, the Attorney General put an end to the matter of his intended trial. Longstreet applied for a presidential pardon and unsurprisingly, was refused. President Johnson was adamant in his reply. "There are three persons of the South who will never receive amnesty: Mr.

Davis, General Lee, and yourself. You have given the Union cause too much trouble."

During the first few years of Reconstruction, Longstreet became president of the Southern and Western Life and Accident Insurance Company, joined a cotton brokerage firm and unsuccessfully tried to enter the railroad business. He argued that the best course of action for the South was to obey federal laws and support Reconstruction. Longstreet also recommended that white southerners should join the Republican Party, because otherwise it would be dominated by the newly enfranchised former slaves. Though he was no proponent of racial equality, he believed that it would be to the South's advantage to find a way for Blacks and Whites to find a way to work

together.

James Longstreet's views won him few friends among the southern white population. To most of them, "Reconstruction" was synonymous to "Occupation." Indeed, there were thousands of federal troops still stationed in the South during the first decade after the Civil War. The Republican Party was the party of Lincoln, abolition, and invasion. Southerners had quickly forgotten that they had brought war and ruin onto their own heads with the bombardment of Fort Sumter. They also had forgotten that thousands of northern Democrats flocked to join the Union army. To them, the Republican Party was composed of wild-eyed liberals and pointy-headed professors. As for the notion that Whites and Blacks should cooperate with each other, the short explanation was, "forget it." Southern Whites who joined the Republican Party were termed "scalawags." (Scalawag is an archaic term which means "rascal.") Though we can all think of worse modern epithets, to be considered a scalawag was far from a compliment.

In June 1868, again with Grant's help, Longstreet received a pardon. Now that he was enfranchised, Longstreet offi-

cially joined the Republican Party. He supported his friend's bid for the presidency. The following year, Ulysses S. Grant became the 18th President of the United States. Longstreet was present at the inauguration. Less than a week later, he received an appointment as surveyor of customs in New Orleans.

This wasn't well received by Longstreet's white southern peers. It was a lucrative post that had a salary of \$6,000, worth nearly \$145,000 in today's currency. Southern Democrats portrayed him as a cynical opportunist. To make matters worse in their eyes, Black and White officials worked together at the Customs House. The idea of an integrated society was utterly repugnant in the former Confederate states. (In all fairness, it should be noted that the idea wasn't warmly received by most white northerners either.) Southern society began to ostracize Longstreet. D.H. Hill, a former friend of Longstreet's, wrote, "Our scalawag is the local leper of the community."

Undeterred, Longstreet gave his support to the Republican governor, Henry C. Warmouth. Warmouth, a former Union officer, was considered a "carpetbagger." In other words, a Northerner who had moved to the South for the


purpose of political and financial gain. Carpetbaggers were hated as much, if not more than the federal troops still left in the South. Longstreet was rewarded for his loyalty by being appointed adjutant general of the Louisiana State Militia, which had been racially integrated. This was an outrage to most white Louisianans; he was now held to be some sort of reincarnation of John Brown, the infamous abolitionist of the pre-Civil War era. In addition, Longstreet was named president of the New Orleans and Northeastern Railroad. This further encouraged allegations of opportunism. Less than two years later, Longstreet was promoted to major general of the Louisiana state militia. He now commanded all militia and police forces in New Orleans.

1874 was a fateful year in the history of Reconstruction Louisiana. There had been a lot of violent racial and political discord there after the Civil War ended. The same holds true for many of the former Confederate states, but the discord was particularly brutal in Louisiana. Indeed, it was mostly because of the violence in Louisiana that Congress passed the Reconstruction Act. Everything came to a head two years earlier following the election of Republican Governor William

Pitt Kellogg in 1872.

It had been a close and heavily contested election, with charges of fraud from both parties. Even today, it's hard to tell who should have been the legitimate winner. The Gilded Age was not a shining example of political integrity anywhere in the country, but corruption was an especially defining characteristic of the South during Reconstruction. On April 13, 1873, the supporters of the Democratic candidate John McEnery, a former Confederate general, perpetrated a hideous event in Grant Parish in the northeastern part of Louisiana. Known as the Colfax Massacre, it resulted in the deaths of at least 150 black militiamen. Longstreet sent the state militia to attempt to rescue the militiamen, but they arrived a day late. The only job left for them was to bury the dead. It must have been especially grisly work because some of the bodies had been mutilated in a manner that would have made a Comanche blush.

In April 1874, things got particularly confused when McEnery and his allies declared a second legislature in New Orleans, which was then Louisiana's state seat.





A battle erupted between the state militia and the White League, a pro-McEnery paramilitary group. This unedifying spectacle involved a siege when the outnumbered state militia was forced to take refuge in the Customs House. Longstreet, along with Governor Kellogg, anxiously waited for federal troops to come to their


rescue. When order was restored, a compromise was reached where the insurgents agreed to withdraw in exchange for the dismissal of all charges. More than 30 people died during the Canal Street Riot, also known as the Battle of Liberty Place. Federal troops remained in Louisiana until the formal end of Reconstruction in 1877. Longstreet wasn't there by that time. He wisely decided it would be a good idea to move back to Gainesville, Georgia, his family home. He had another ongoing battle to fight.

Several former Confederate generals had been attacking Longstreet in local papers for his cooperation with the Republican Party and for his support of Reconstruction. These began in 1872 and were to plague him for the rest of his life. His war record was criticized, especially his conduct at the Battle of Gettysburg. Jubal Early led the charge.

Although Early was only one of the proponents of the "Lost Cause" interpretation of the Civil War, he was probably the loudest. Bitter and unrepentant, Early was outraged that a fellow former Confederate general would not only advocate Republican policies but would

lead integrated militia troops against his fellow white Southerners. According to Early and some of Lee's former commanders, Longstreet was a traitor to his social class, his former comrades, his region, and his race. Early's attacks resembled those of a medieval bishop hurling anathemas against a heretic.

Longstreet vigorously defended his reputation. Whenever he had spare time, he responded to nasty editorials and speeches. William "Sandy" Pendleton, who had been commander of Lee's artillery, accused Longstreet of deliberately refusing Lee's order to attack at sunrise on July 3, 1863. Single-handedly, according to Pendleton, Longstreet had caused the failure of Pickett's Charge. With this accusation, Pendleton contradicted his own report written shortly after the battle. Longstreet mentioned this during his defense of himself, but it did little good to change his critics' minds. Though Pendleton never could prove his charges,

it didn't matter. "Alternate facts" have been around for a long time.

In an 1874 interview with the *Indianapolis Journal*, Longstreet aptly summed up the situation. "Men can't all think alike, and the problem with the Southern people has always been that they won't tolerate any difference of opinion. If God Almighty had intended all men to think just alike, He might as well have made but one man." There's a lot of truth in that quote; it applies as much to the New South as it did to the Old South.

Despite his local unpopularity, Longstreet had an extensive political career. Of course, he wouldn't get many votes in an election, but he served his country through several political appointments. Unsurprisingly, these were Republican appointments. Under the Hayes administration, Longstreet was Minister Resident to the Ottoman Empire. In 1881, he was appointed a U.S. Marshal in Georgia. When Grover

Cleveland, a Democrat, was elected in 1884, his political career came to a temporary halt. Though Cleveland was from New York, he dared not have anything to do with a southern Republican.

Longstreet went back to Gainesville and went into semi-retirement. On April 9, 1889, (the 24th anniversary of Appomattox) Longstreet's house burned to the ground. He lost most of his personal papers in the blaze. Later that year, his wife Louise died. However, Longstreet was a tough old hoss and wouldn't let anything knock him down.

In 1896, his memoir, From *Manassas to Appomattox*, was published. Longstreet dared to criticize Robert E. Lee's strategic thinking, even though his account of his former commander was respectful. Although I've never read the book, it seems that Longstreet went out of his way to disparage some of the former generals who had attacked him in print after the war. Jubal Early had died a couple of years previously, but he figured prominently in Longstreet's rebuttals.

In retrospect, it's too bad Jubal died before the book came out. He had become a tiresome old bore. In the 1880s he donated \$1,000.00 to erect a statue of Robert E. Lee in Richmond. When Early learned that the pedestal had been made of Maine granite, he threw a fit and withdrew his contribution. His devotion to Lee had begun to resemble that of the character Renfield in Bram Stoker's Dracula. Longstreet's memoir would probably have sent him into convulsions. It would have been a fitting end.

With the election of William McKinley, Longstreet's political fortunes were on the rise. He was appointed U.S. Commissioner of Railroads, a position he retained until his death in 1904. Longstreet even managed to pull a few surprises out of his hat during his autumn years. He remarried in 1897 when he was 76 years old. His new wife, Helen Dortch, a former librarian, was 34. Something tells me she wasn't invited over for tea very often by the local chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy. She outlived Longstreet by almost six decades and spent a lot of her time defending his reputation. She was surely up to the task. Helen was an exceptionally intelligent and independent woman. She was an early feminist, a suffragette, and even kept her maiden name after marriage.

When the Spanish-American War broke out in 1898, Longstreet volunteered to lead U.S. troops in Cuba. He was 77 years old at the time. He didn't get a commission and that was probably a good thing. He might have been able to stand the climate, but the fact was he was far too old to go gallivanting into another in war. A couple of years after the turn of the century, his health began a steady decline. He suffered from rheumatoid arthritis and could barely walk. Then he developed eye cancer, which was treated with the newfangled X-Ray therapy. In January 1904, he contracted pneumonia and the end came swiftly.

Thousands marched in Longstreet's funeral procession. It was the largest gathering ever seen in Gainesville, Georgia. Nevertheless, it could have been grander, as would normally befit an American hero. The Savanna chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy refused to send a wreath. Many other ex-Confederates declined to attend. However, President Theodore Roosevelt sent Helen Dortch a graceful letter in which he lauded the old general's "highsouled patriotism" and described him

"as staunchly loyal to the Union as he had been loyal to the cause for which he fought during the war itself."

You won't see any statues of Longstreet in the southern states. I suppose it's a moot point, because they would have been removed anyway during the Great Purge of Confederate statues during the last decade. The simple fact that you won't (or wouldn't) see them is that none were erected to begin with. Longstreet was simply too controversial for southerners to celebrate his memory. To use a contemporary term, he had been "canceled" because of his about-face after the Civil War. It wasn't until 1998 that a statue was erected to the memory of General James Longstreet. It stands in an obscure part of the Gettysburg National Military Park. It's kind of a cheesy monument, in my opinion. The horse looks like an oversized dog and there is no pedestal. Maybe they just don't make equestrian statues like they used to, but the statue seems like an apologetic afterthought.

The whole Longstreet controversy serves as a reminder that cancel culture and political correctness are clumsy weapons wielded by both ends of the political spectrum. They only serve to bludgeon us further into our respective corners. This kind of thing has been around for a long time and has never served us well, unless you believe that encouraging ignorance is beneficial. Hopefully we'll learn to avoid these pitfalls in the future.





### THE FAR FRONTIER PART II CIRCA 1582


Editor's note: This article comprises the second part of a two-part report on the early American West by the author. Part one appeared in the January 2024 issue of The Cowboy Chronicle.

In April of 1582, after ten months in what is now New Mexico, the remaining members of the Chamuscado party straggled back to Santa Barbara. One of the witnesses to their homecoming was a prosperous cattle rancher from central Mexico named Antonio de Espejo who, at the moment, was hiding from the law avoiding a heavy fine levied against him months earlier, and arriving in Santa Barbara shortly before Chamuscado's men got there. He listened carefully to their stories about the region they had explored — and he also heard the complaints from local Franciscans about the fact that two of their number had been left behind in the pueblo country.

After weighing his circumstances, Espejo developed a plan; he would organize, finance, and lead an expedition to the north to find the friars and protect them from harm. Enlisting fourteen soldiers and one friar for his venture, Espejo left Santa Barbara in November of 1582, accompanied by Indian servants. All were well mounted, with a remuda of more than a hundred horses and mules to maintain that condition. The Spaniards were armed and equipped as Chamuscado's party had been - steel helmets, chain mail coats and breeches, swords, and the all-important harquebuses — the firearms.

The party pushed hard. Diego Perez de Luxan, who kept a journal of the expedition, noted repeatedly that "...the mounts were worn out." At a point not far south of present-day El Paso the horses were so worn down that the party halted for a week, re-shoeing the animals where needed and using part of the time to do a little gunsmithing.

"[The native's] mode of fighting is with Turkish bows and arrows, and

[clubs] made of tornillo-wood, which is very strong and flexible. We all made stocks for our harquebuses from this tornillo-wood because it was very suitable for the purpose. These stocks were fashioned by an Indian whom we brought with us, a good man, and a fine soldier and harquebusier named Gregorio de Tlaxcala."

With weapons restocked and horses rested, the men pressed on. By mid-January of 1583 they had reached and passed the site of El Paso, in weather cold enough to freeze the water holes. Moving north along the Rio Grande, they halted in

early February at a pueblo near present-day La Joya, and there they got grim news: "...the Indians told us by means of signs that the friars had been killed," probably because of the tools and trade goods that Chamuscado had left with them. Ready for battle, Espejo and his men rode north to Puala pueblo, where the murders had occurred (just north of the site of Albuquerque), but found it abandoned.

With the main reason for the expedition gone, Espejo could have turned for home. During the trek north, however, he had heard the





usual rumors about rich mines, and decided to seek them out. Breaking away from the Rio Grande, the party first headed northwest along the Jemez River, then turned west toward the Zuni Pueblos, passing Acoma and riding through intermittent snowfalls. Just beyond Zuni lay Hawikuh (near the present Arizona-New Mexico border), and while resting the horses there, they heard words that they much wanted to hear; an Indian who came into their camp picked up a Spanish trumpet and said, "...sixty days from his town toward the northwest was something shiny like that. It was in the west, of higher quality and more shiny than the metal of the trumpet. [We] showed him a copper spoon to see if he would say that it was like that, but he maintained that it was like the metal of the trumpet and even better. He said that in the place mentioned where the metal is found the natives wear it [on] their arms [and] head."

That was enough for Espejo's men—once again they saddled up for a journey west. The Indians assured them that they would have no trouble along the way, because of their

"...arms, horses, and harquebuses... good defensive weapons which shot fire and made the stones crumble like the lightning from heaven."

As promised, there was no Indian trouble — it would come later — but their journey toward the sunset was long, and the country rugged. Just west of the Little Colorado River, near present-day Winslow, Arizona, they encountered "...dense, rough woodlands with bad trails, a very dangerous route in an enemy country. We descended a slope so steep and perilous that a mule belonging to Captain Antonio de Espejo fell and was dashed to pieces." Regardless, they pressed on, and finally found the mines, "...in a very rough sierra, and so worthless that we did not find in any of them a trace of silver, as they were copper mines, and poor." Besides the disappointment, it was now early May and they had traveled some 100 leagues, or 260 miles, west of the Rio Grande

So they turned back, plodding

eastward past Hawikuh and Zuni without incident until they halted at an Indian rancheria near Acoma, where real trouble started. For some reason, the natives "...surprised us with a shower of arrows and much shouting. [So] we rushed at once to the horses, firing our harquebuses. For this reason the Indians wounded only one horse...[Then] half of our men with all the servants went to the rancheria and set [it on] fire."

A truce followed, but it was brief. Several days earlier one of Espejo's men, Francisco Barreto, had acquired an unwilling Indian woman as a servant and now, during the fusillade of arrows and gunfire, she fled to the hostile Indians. Determined to keep her, Barreto attempted a parley, asking Luxan to cover his back. As a gesture of good faith, he was willing to leave both his sword and harquebus behind and begged Luxan to do the same. So with misgivings, Luxan left his harquebus on his saddle and with Barreto beside him he approached the natives

on foot.

His fear was well founded. Half-way to the Indian position they walked into another shower of arrows, two of which hit Barreto in the cheek and arm. Badly outnumbered and without guns, the Spaniards retreated to their horses and recovered their weapons. Then, in view of the odds against them, they decided to continue toward the Rio Grande.

There, more Indian trouble awaited them. The pueblo of Puala, where Chamuscado's friars had been killed, was no longer abandoned. Instead, about 30 Indians on the roofs shouted insults at the Spaniards.

Espejo was in no mood to negotiate, and ordered an attack. First, "... the corners of the pueblo were taken by four men, and four others with two servants began to seize those natives who showed themselves...[Then] we took out the prisoners, two at a time, and lined them up against some cottonwoods close to the pueblo of Puala, where they were garroted and shot

many times until they were dead. Sixteen were executed... This was a remarkable deed for so few people in the midst of so many enemies...."

Furthermore, "The news of what had happened at Puala spread throughout the provinces and the people were very much afraid and all served and regaled us."

With that murderous matter settled, the party continued east, across the Rio Grande, again looking for mines. As food was getting scarce, they halted at the great pueblo of Pecos to ask for provisions, but the natives refused. So the Spaniards edged into the place "...with great precaution and care, [and] discharged some of the harquebuses while passing through the plaza... [the Indians] became so frightened that hardly one of them dared to appear." Finally an old man showed himself, begging the intruders not to fire again and promising to give them everything they would need for the trip to Santa Barbara. Resupplied, Espeso's men turned for home, following the Pecos River south instead of the Rio Grande. In September of 1583, after ten months on the trail, the party reached Santa Barbara. Then Espejo wrote a report — a report with no mention of the disappointing mines or the sixteen Indians executed at Puala, but one that would practically guarantee other expeditions would follow.


"...In the greater part of those provinces, there is an abundance of game beasts and birds...There are also fine wooded mountains with trees of all kinds, salines, and rivers containing a great variety of fish. Carts and wagons can be driven through most of this region and there are good pastures for cattle as well as lands suitable for vegetables or grain crops, whether irrigated or depending on seasonal rains. There are many rich mines, too..."


The era of the Wild West was about to begin.

## DISPATCHES FROM FORT BAYLOR SLICK MCCLADE'S DREAM GUN BECOMES A PIETTA MATCH READY GUN

slick McClade (SASS #69490), in case you've never heard of him (unlikely), is a 10-time World and National Champion in B-Western.

But wait, there's more! His wife, Miss Allotta Steel (SASS #69492) decided she wanted to shoot Classic Cowgirl. Classic is the hardest category to shoot (with the possible exception of Frontiersman). It requires big bore (.40 caliber or larger) revolvers and rifle, hammer double or '87 Lever action shotgun, and specific costume items that have to be worn to all match activities, including bed and in the shower (just kidding, but then one Classic Cowboy says wearing his

chaps to bed is reserved for special occasions).

Slick decided to switch to Classic Cowboy with her. He had never shot duelist or hammer doubles, and he was used to a Marlin '94 instead of a '73 rifle.

As expected, the experts predicted failure in that effort but he went to work dry practicing five nights a week, no live fire except matches. I perked up at that. I can't practice live fire SASS techniques without a two-hour round trip drive. The punch line? Now he's a three-time Classic Cowboy World and National Champion.

Additionally, he fits in my list of "the real thing." There are several in SASS. The Real things are people who are really what they present to be. In his case, I was convinced he was in 2013 at Winter Range. After I shot Saturday, I had left my Ruger Old Armies with him so he could fit Sure Hit Sights on them. Sunday morning, while having breakfast The Redhead and I saw Facebook posts of Vendors Row flat on the ground after a twister

had come through.

We immediately went to the range, not knowing what to expect. All of the tents were down, and their contents spread out. People were working to make sense of the situation. As we walked toward the back row, we saw Slick standing at a folding table doing the final touches on the front sight with a Dremel polisher.

Slick has done a lot of work on revolvers, modifying them into match guns. He concluded that match grade guns should be, in his words, available out of the box. Such guns are rare. This is difficult for a manufacturer to do economically, and the market is tough.

Slick tells the story. "In 2019 I decided to approach Alessandro Pietta about building a match grade single action that someone could purchase straight from the manufacturer, take it out of the box, take it to a match, and not have to do anything to it. At that time we were building match grade guns using Ruger frames and match grade Shilen barrels and my partner was thinking of going out of business.

So I approached Allesandro Pietta."

Perhaps you don't know Pietta. Allesandro Pietta (Achimista, SASS #41531) is a long time SASS shooter as well as being a Pietta. He has done a lot for SASS and made it possible for EMF to continue in business after General Grant died. In case you're not familiar with Pietta, from EMF, F.A.P F.LLI, "Pietta was established in 1960 by Knight Giuseppe Pietta. The company first entered the world of gun-making by producing hunting guns, including side-by-side and over and under shotguns. In 1964, F.A.P. F.LLI. Pietta started manufacturing replicas of the firearms used in the American Civil War. Over the years, they have made an excellent reputation (in a very difficult market) for making quality black powder reproductions. In 2002, Mr. Gordon Davis, (General U. S. Grant, SASS #2) CEO/ President of EMF Company turned to Knight Giuseppe Pietta to manufacture EMF's Great Western line of single action revolvers. The joint efforts of these two great companies have resulted in the production of one of the finest single action revolvers on the market today."

Pietta makes replica firearms, and their SAA replicas have become more and more popular in SASS as they make several with four-click hammers like real Colts. The import requirement for a safety of some sort is fulfilled with a two-position base pin. If pushed in too far it makes it impossible to fire the gun. I discovered this when reassembling one gun after cleaning. (Though I never recommend removing a safety feature permanently I note there are a few competition-only modifications. Evil Roy, for example, had his gunsmith shorten the base pin on his Evil Roy revolvers.

Standard length base pins are available online. If you get a pair of those and use them for SASS, keep the original "import legal" base pin. Put them in the guns when you sell them. Liability lawyers are quite good these days.

Slick continued, "Alessandro was all for it and was excited about the project and shortly after we decided he sent me a prototype I put on my YouTube channel, and I actually won

a world championship with a prototype gun. It ran very well and I literally quit counting after 10,000 rounds.

"As we were getting ready to start production COVID hit and totally shut down everything and set the project back all the way to last year.

"Alessandro finally sent a couple of samples over and once they were approved, put them in production."

#### PRODUCTION GUN FEATURES

Octagonal barrel, the extra weight minimizes recoil and muzzle flip for rapid follow-up shots. Keeping all five shots of a "dump" is easier.

Historically, Colt used octagonal barrels for the 1836 Paterson and 1851 Navy, later switching to round barrels to increase production. Handmade octagon barrels took a lot of time.

The front of the muzzle, the cylinder, and the ejector rod housing have all been rounded for easier re-holstering.

The front sight is solid brass, about .125" wide, and stands out very well.

The rear sight is wide to accom-

modate the front sight. The sight picture is bright and fast.

It has a wide, low profile hammer. Low profile hammers are preferable for duelists, shortening the reach of the thumb. For two-handed shooters, if the gun has been short-stroked, the lowered hammer works. If it has not, then the hammer can hit the web of the hand if the grip is high. It shouldn't be, but it happens. The wide hammers are easier to cock.

Complete action work with short stroke from the factory. The action was smooth and light, no flaws.

#### THE CYLINDER


"We lengthened the cylinder notch to a point instead of round so that way you get a smoother rotation of your cylinder. This is something that's pretty much exclusive."

#### THE TRIGGER

"One thing I did change from the prototype was the trigger. The '73 was designed with a narrow trigger off to the left. This is perfect for a right-handed shooter shooting one handed.

"Of course we have people shooting gunfighter or double duelist, or those of us who shoot with our left hand. The wide trigger solves the problem.

"The trigger pull is four pounds and very crisp. They have to be four pounds or more for import regulations. Lightening the trigger on Colt pattern guns is fairly easy. If you are a shooter new to SASS, I would suggest adjusting the shooter to the trigger

and see if that works. If they were mine, I would just shoot them. Yes, my Rugers have light, gunsmith-tuned triggers. I don't seem to have a problem going from one to the other.

"The factory grips made by Pietta are checkered with fine checkering and provide a very good grip.

#### **AVAILABILITY**

"They are now in production. We just got the second batch this week. The second batch has 5.5-inch guns in it as well as 4.75 so this design, called the Competition, will be engraved nickel. For the second batch we did a little trigger modification (right at four pounds on my trigger pull gauges, one electronic, one spring driven).

The GWII GUNFIGHTER COMPETITION guns are available only from EMF Company, Inc. 1900 East Warner Ave. Ste. 1-D, Santa Ana, CA 92705, 1-800-430-1310 | 949-261-6611. Currently they have blue/case hardened models in .45 Colt and .357 Mag/.38 Special in 4.75" and 5.5" barrels.

In the works are nickel plated models with factory engraving and possibly other variations.

# GADGETS AND TOOLS FROM UNIQUETEK

t my first Winter Range in 2000 I saw many neat vendors. Many of those are gone now and never replaced. One that stood out and is still here is UniqueTek. Lee Love owns it and works the matches and gun shows himself. He introduced me to several things that I added to my SASS tool collection over the years.



Since then I've written about several things I got from him. After the column became "a thing," I got some just for testing and writing about them. Many of those written about have a place in some shooter's shop or gun cart

I had planned a full article in April, an online only issue with more room than the written issues, for items I hadn't gotten around to writing about, but that article got bumped. So, since I don't have enough room for a big article, I'm doing a couple for this issue and scheduling more for the future.

#### **POWDER MEASURE DRAIN-N-CHANGE**

If you don't like taking a powder measure down to drain and change powder, this is for you. The instructions are complete and very good, so I won't repeat them here. Essentially you push the powder bar out with the Drain-N-Change going in right behind it. You loosen and remove he bell crank Cube and try not to lose it. It is best dealt with while the powder measure is horizontal. That kind of defeats the purpose of draining powder in place. I recommend getting five spares from Dillon first. Don't ask me why. Verify that powder is completely gone if you're changing powders.


#### **XL650 PRIMER EJECTOR TOOL**

The 650 uses a rotary magazine. Six primers will be in it between the pick-up point under the priming station. If it is not used, then it will be dropped to the primer chute. Do not attempt to use the 650 primer ejector tool to force a jammed rotary primer disk. Applying that much force may bend the primer indexing arm and rotary primer disc. It is recommend-

ed to remove the primer system from the press. The 650 Primer Ejector Tool can also be used at the start for of a reloading session to advance the rotary primer disk to where the first primer will arrive at station two at the same

time as the first case. This requires just

six strokes. This does not constitute instructions for use. Read the ones that come with the tool.

#### **OPTIONAL HOLDER**

Their Primer Rod Holder just happens to fit this to hang it on the Primer System Magazine. I consider this to be mandatory. Otherwise I'll lose it in the shop. Several guns and a Jeep Wagoneer are lost in there.

## SHOOTING WILD BUNCH WITH A THOMPSON RIFLE?

y job with the Former Texas Rangers Foundation presents the wonderful opportunity to teach youngsters about the guns of the Texas Rangers. When a thirteen-year-old fellow asked, "Isn't a Thompson old school, Kid?" that's when the idea struck me that Thompsons might prove a viable pistol-caliber rifle for SASS Wild Bunch competitions, the movie, *The Wild Bunch* being an all-time favorite of mine. That movie's setting is 1913, so Thompsons, like the Browning M-1917 water-cooled machinegun in the film, are anachronistic.

For clarification in this article, I'll refer to the semi-automatic Thompson as the Thompson rifle or T-rifle and the select-fire model as a submachine gun or Tommy gun. The difference between the


Tommy gun and the T-rifle is that the Tommy gun fires from an open bolt while the T-rifle operates from a closed bolt. The submachine guns have two selectors on the fram's left side. The front switch selects either the full auto or a single-shot mode. The back switch selects "fire" or "safe" modes. The Thompson rifle has a single switch for "fire" or "safe." An important step to remember about the T-rifle is never cock (draw the bolt rearward) with the selector in the safe position, or in time you'll break the firing pin. I'm going to address only the T-rifle in this article.

I operate two Deluxe Thompson rifles, an M-1927A-1 with a detachable butt stock and an M-1942A-1, both chambered in .45 ACP. The M-1927 can be charged with stick magazines of 10, 20, or 30 cartridges and a 50- or 100-round drum magazine. The M-1942 only accommodates stick magazines. I recommend using 20- or 30-round magazines. The 10-round magazine is a nice fit, but it can be tough to charge with 10 rounds. A drum makes the rifle clumsy to stage and

isn't the easiest device to install rapidly. The bolt locks back on an empty stick magazine of the '27 or the '42 however, without a device called the "third-hand" installed, with a drum magazine the bolt won't lock back when the drum is empty.

Something to consider if you decide to operate a Thompson rifle as your main match rifle is that the M-1927 weighs 13.5 pounds, and the M-1942 weighs 11 pounds empty. Both have heavy main recoil springs, so when cocking and/or charging the rifle you may have yourself a handful. The '27 has a Lyman Vernier rear sight; the '42 has a crude L-shaped metal rear sight. Both rifles have large fixed front sight blades. Either sight system is easy to acquire when addressing these rifles correctly. Because of the rifle's weight, recoil from the .45 ammunition is negligible, like many SASS-legal lever or pump rifles.

My experience with Thompson rifles, like with my 1911 pistols, is they should be well-lubricated. It won't take you long to discover how much lubrication is sufficient. After discharging 150 rounds

through each of my two rifles, I noticed the rifle bolt's wear-in marks. Once I polished these marks from each bolt and lubricated the bolts, much like my 1911 frame rails, both rifles ran without feeding or cycling issues. Watch the health of your magazines, like your pistol magazines, and try to not drop your magazines on hard surfaces whenever possible.

The 1927A-1 specifications are 13.5 pounds and 13.665 pounds with ten rounds. The overall length is 41 inches. The sight radius is 28 inches. The frame width is 1.8 inches. My semi-automatic trigger measured 9.5 pounds, mildly heavy yet very smooth. How do the T-Ri-

fles measure up to SASS Wild Bunch legal rifles? These rifles have 16- to 20-inch barrels and a magazine capacity of 10-30 rounds, utilizing the .45 ACP cartridge, like our 1911 pistols. It operates from a closed bolt using a gas-blow-back system. It is hand-manipulated to cock the hammer and charge the chamber with the initial cartridge. The bolt locks open when the magazine is emptied. The T-rifle frame is ¼-inch taller than the submachine gun, so if you have original-issue military stick magazines, they will require a modification of 1/4-inch to lock into the frame's magazine well catch. The T-rifle isn't an NFA classified firearm and doesn't violate

most clubs' prohibition about machineguns.

You ask, "Doesn't that semi-automatic rifle give you a winning edge in speed?" When timed, I emptied 16 rounds from my Henry lever rifle in 11 seconds. Shooting 16 rounds from my Thompson Rifle took me about 13 seconds.

Using a 230-grain lead round-nose projectile like those of my 1911, ammunition has worked well in both T-rifles. My primary reloading reference is the Lyman reloading manuals and I've found success with the following propellants: Bullseye, Blue Dot, WW-231, Unique, Zip, and Trail Boss. I've used all kinds of the popular large pistol primers successfully.

These rifles are hardy, yet like all Cowboy guns, you'll experience breakage. I've discovered that firing pins and recoil spring guides will break before many of these rifles' other parts. Having your extractor factory-adjusted and watching out for your magazines' health makes for a smooth-running rifle. Kahr Firearms Group is where I purchase spare parts (www.shopkahrfirearmsgroup.com/parts-accessories/1927-tommy-gun).

So, whether you wear Old West toggery or trend towards the US Army Uniform of 1910, the Thompson rifle ought to win you style points.

to you. T-rifles aren't SASS-legal rifles. I hope, via a few amended rules, regulations, and SASS' permission, Thompson rifles might be grafted into future Wild Bunch competitions. Should you have a Thompson rifle handy, give this firearm a go. I'm sure you won't regret it.




On occasion, when the Apache Kid was subject to discrimination he negotiated diplomatically, backed up by his 1911 Colt and the quote "how do you like me now?"

In the Viet Nam era he enlisted in the U.S. Navy and patrolled the Tonkin Gulf. The Apache Kid met Grey Fox and Miss Mary Spencer at the fourth END of TRAIL, May of 1985. The Kid was a skilled artisan woodworker, leather crafter, and much more. He was always involved with projects. He was an avid Cowboy Action Shooter™ and signed up on the first day when SASS was organized in

1987. The Grey Fox organized the first mounted ride-in at END of TRAIL, Coto de Caza 1987, he called the Apache Kid to be a participant and the Kid replied "he would be there." The Kid was always delighted to be involved in an adventure. When the Grey Fox suggested in 1988 that they drive a herd of cattle over the highest cattle trail in North America the Kid's reply "what time do you want me to be there?" The Grey Fox and Miss Spencer organized the first SASS affiliated match in Canada in 1992. When organizing the 1994 edition, Grey Fox asked the Kid to be the honored guest, the Kid replied he would. The Grey Fox and Miss Spencer embarked on producing Wild West Shows and asked the Apache Kid to star. He again agreed.

1992 was a stellar year for the Apache Kid. He was cast as a member of the Red Sash Gang in the movie *Tombstone*. He enthusiastically responded, his fame began to grow and other movie work was offered. In the summer of 1996 the Apache Kid was featured in a street theatre performance in Deadwood, South Dakota. Fall of 1996 the he and a group of SASS pistoleros organized a 65th birthday party for the Grey Fox in the Governor's Room of the Irma Hotel, Cody, Wyoming. It was incredible. The Apache Kid not only enjoyed being the feature, he liked to share joy with his friends.

The Apache Kid was our valued friend for two months shy of 40 years. He enjoyed the history, the culture, and the ethic of the Old West, and lived it. His word was never in question, his actions sincere, he could be trusted to follow through, if he said it, he would do it. That's the Cowboy Way! He will be remembered!

ike McCloskey (I.B. Groty, SASS #3969) believed he was born in the wrong century, as he longed for the cowboy life. He caught the Cowboy Action bug while attending a shoot with son Chris and his longtime friend Bob Scalese in 1994. In 1995, while shooting at High Ore, Montana, Mike found out Gene Afdahl (Lobo), from Sun River, was interested in starting a club. Mike met with Gene to discuss club ideas and land options for a range. Also in attendance were Chris McCloskey (Lefty Kid), Tom Mullane (Dr. Lance deBoyle) and Diane Nelson (Prairie Princess, SASS #6706). By April 1996, the organization had received their Federal ID number and non-profit status. Temporary officers were Gene Afdahl, President, Mike McCloskey, Vice-president, and Diane Nelson as Secretary/Treasurer. In July, the organization registered with the State of Montana as the Sun River Rangers Shooting Society, applied for an NRA affiliation and signed a land lease agreement with the Broken O Ranch for a range. Their first shoot was August 15, 1996 with twenty attendees. New leadership was installed in October of 1996. By the fall of 1997, the club was in turmoil. Members were asking questions about finances, lack of meetings, the status of the land purchase and new by-laws filed with the Montana Secretary of State without membership approval. At a membership meeting in Feb 1998,

the by-laws were reviewed and amended but never updated with the State. There were still financial questions that were not being answered by the Treasurer. B.C. Caffyn (Wapiti Willie) was elected President in October of 1998 and a leave of absence left the position of Member at Large open. Mr. Caffyn appointed Mike McCloskey I.B.) to that position. Representing the club, I.B. cleaned up the State filing issues, resumed negotiations for the land purchase and started an audit of the club books. By January 1999, the past Treasurer had not turned over the books to the new Treasurer, who was elected in October of 1998. There was sufficient evidence to file criminal fraud charges against the past Treasurer. It was at this point that I.B. took a pause from the club after suffering from a stroke. But the ball was rolling and the club finalized the land purchase and received restitution from the past Treasurer.

I.B. was born in Seattle, WA and loved spending time on his paternal grandfather's farm near Yelm, WA, helping with a small herd of cows. He graduated Mercer Island High School in 1967 and attended the University of Puget Sound in Tacoma, WA. He was a member of the Sigma Chi fraternity and graduated with a bachelor's degree in Business Administration. He played college football until a neck injury curtailed his action on the field. Not to be sidelined, he joined the crew team and cross-country ski team. He was pilot qualified through ROTC but was dropped from the program when he developed diabetes at the age of 21. He was a grain merchandiser or manager for many grain companies throughout the Pacific Northwest for more than twenty years. Settling in Great Falls, Montana, he became licensed as a financial adviser, working until his retirement in 2018.

He married his best friend, Diane Nelson (Prairie Princess), in 1997. Together they made an effective and formidable team, volunteering for many organizations in Great Falls.

In addition to Cowboy Action Shooting<sup>™</sup>, Mike enjoyed many activities with his family and friends — camping, fishing, hunting, clam digging, and photography. He treasured the time teaching son, Chris and his friends to hunt and fish while coaching many of Chris' youth sports activities. He cowboyed several seasons on the Sun Ranch in southwest

Montana. He was a member of the C. M. Russell Museum's Charlie's Friends, the East Valley quick response team, and a volunteer fireman with the Sun Prairie department. As a life member of Cascade County Search and Rescue he helped guide the unit to the successful realization of a county mill levy for SAR funding. His greatest accomplishment was attaining his EMT certificate after suffering a stroke in 1999 and becoming a staff member of ETC of Montana, which offers emergency provider education across the state.

In 2016 he was fortunate to have received a kidney transplant and looked forward to renewed life with family and friends. But immunosuppressants made him susceptible to all sorts of infections and viruses. Over the next years he would experience many trips to the ER but maintained his optimism on life and his humorous character. He always had a smile on his face and a contagious laugh. He jokingly wondered if he could visit all the emergency rooms in Pacific Northwest during his lifetime.







# SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

The Cowboy Chronicle welcomes and encourages submissions of articles and match reports from any and all readers.

Please submit articles in MS Word or something compatible. Open Office and Apple Pages (saved as MS Word) are also fine. A count of 500-800 words is a good target to shoot for, but shorter pieces are also fine. Match reports on larger events, like END of TRAIL, Winter Range, and Regional and Divisional matches may run 1000-1500 words if necessary. We will accept lengthier articles, but may choose to break them up into two or more parts to run in consecutive issues, or heavily edit them.

Please do not embed your photos in the Word document. They can be extracted for use in the *The Cowboy Chronicle*, but it can be a chore to do that. Instead, send your photos separately, in one or more emails, as attachments. Three to six photos per email usually works best. It's best to send JPEGs, but other formats are acceptable, and it's best to keep them at about 300 dpi and 3000 pixels (10 inches) on the short side. That size is

ideal and will allow us plenty of leeway when it comes to cropping and adjusting them for publication. Photos should be at least 1000 pixels on the short side to be used for publication. If you're unsure of the size of your pictures, or how to size them, send what you have and we'll adjust them and/or inform you if they're usable.

Usually, two to six photos are sufficient for an article, but we will consider using more for a "big" event, if provided. Photos need not have captions, but captions always make photos more interesting. Ideally, the caption would consist of one or two sentences that say something about the picture that is not obvious and/or is not implicit in the body of the article. "Sam making smoke" is a title but not a caption. "Sam, SASS #XXXXX, shooting his first black powder match; after much deliberation, he decided to give it a try and now he's hooked" is much better. A caption may also serve to let everyone know why the picture is worthy of being published in an international magazine.
